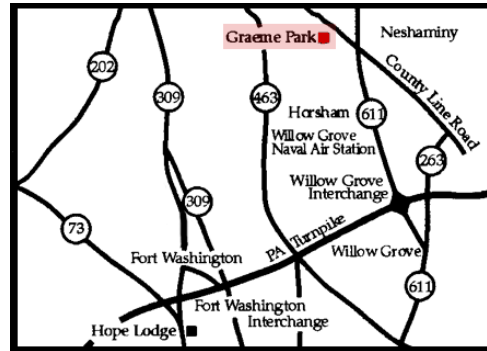

- Pick up is at 2:30 each day at the Visitor's Center.
