## Elizabeth Graeme Fergusson's Poetry & Commonplace Books

Elizabeth kept Commonplace Books, which were a way to keep track of and share information – bits of sermons, conversations, poetry, quotes, recipes or whatever else interested the recorder, throughout her life. There are three known to be in existence: The Willing Commonplace Book (1787-1789), written for the Willing sisters and owned by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, The Yale Commonplace Book, owned by the Library Company of Philadelphia, and a third book, owned by Dickinson College. The Dickinson book has been digitized and transcribed and is available online. This volume contains handwritten poems and transcriptions of correspondence dating from 1770 to 1787. The poetry includes odes, elegies, and neoclassical-style poems written by Fergusson and others, including her husband, Henry Hugh Fergusson, her niece, Anna Young Smith, and Francis Hopkinson. The book also includes transcriptions of correspondence between Fergusson and Anna Young Smith and Elias Boudinet, as well as correspondence between Smith and her husband, Dr. William Smith.

#### HABS and HALS Documentation

In 1958 and 2000 Graeme Park was documented as part of a Historic American Building Survey (HABS) project. In 2010 a student did a Historic American Landscape Survey (HALS). The 1958 project consisted only of photographs. The 2000 project includes photographs and measured drawings. The 2010 landscape project is written documentation and a bibliography of source material.
